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◆ Race to Green Recap ◆

The Illinois Recycling Association partnered with the Land of Lincoln Chapter of SWANA to present the Illinois Recycling and Solid Waste Management Conference & Trade Show on June 8-11. Over 200 attendees, exhibitors and speakers participated in the 3 day event which kicked off with a Welcome Reception at Arlington Park.

While heavy overnight rains wiped out the golf outing, two tours were launched successfully on Monday morning. One headed to points north including MBL Recycling, Fluorecycle, Grayslake EduCycle Center, Maine Plastics and SWALCO. The other headed to Chicago to visit the Center for Green Technology, City of Chicago Electronics Recycling Facility at Goose Island, Allied Waste Services MRF and Acme Refining.

The conference began in earnest with Tuesday morning's Plenary Session, which featured a keynote presentation by Jeff Hohensee of Natural Capitalism Solutions. He was preceded by

Lt. Governor Pat Quinn, who gave a presentation on the Greening of Illinois. The Exhibit Hall Grand Opening followed the Plenary Session. This year a total of 40 exhibitors, including 12 sponsors filled the hall with innovative and informative displays. Fifteen of the exhibitors were first timers. The Trade Show portion of the conference concluded Tuesday evening with the Silent Auction reception. Thanks to all who donated items to this year's auction, which included a live auction of select items. A list of all sponsors and exhibitors is on the conference website.

Three tracks of concurrent sessions ran throughout the day Tuesday and concluded Wednesday morning. Topics were organized under Recycling, Education/Sustainability and Technical tracks. Board of Director Elections

The results of the recent Board of Directors Election were announced at IRA's Annual Meeting, June 11 in Arlington Heights. Six directors were elected to two year terms. Sitting board members Pete Adrian from the Solid Waste Agency of Lake County, Paul Jaquet from Eagle Enterprises Recycling and Kris Kaar from CDM were re-elected to new terms. Marta Keane from Will County Land Use Department returns to the board, having served previously several years ago. Two first time board members were also elected: Mary Crocker from Northern Illinois University and Peter Lyons from William Charles Waste Companies.

Executive Committee Elections

At its first meeting in Arlington Heights, during the Annual Conference, the newly constituted Board elected officers for the coming year. The offices of President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary comprise the Executive Committee, and are elected annually by the Board. The officers for 2008-2009 are: President, Kris Kaar; Vice President, Paul Jaquet; Treasurer, Pete Adrian and Secretary, Dave Miller.

Membership Dues

IRA's Membership Committee has recently completed a thorough review of the Association's membership levels and dues. Over the previous months, the committee considered, discussed and debated numerous options.

At its April Board Meeting, the IRA Board of Directors adopted the following annual membership dues, effective July 1, 2008:

Business \$250

Government \$250

Educational Institution \$150

Not for Profit \$150

Individual \$100

The Associate category has been discontinued, but Business and Government members can add additional people as Individual members as long as a primary membership is maintained. Individual members are voting members and NRC members, but are not listed according to their company or agency unless they are linked to a full business or government membership.

It is significant to note that IRA has not changed its membership dues since 1995, but has increased staff, program, advocacy and member services significantly. We greatly value and depend on all of our members. Changes to the membership dues structure were made for the purpose of strengthening the Association as it seeks continued growth in members and activities. Mercury in CFLs - A Review

The recent surge in interest in compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) has led to concerns about their mercury content. It seems that when consumers purchase the new-style bulbs, they're interested in how they work and how much energy and money they save, so they carefully read the packaging. And then they come to a warning such as "Caution: Contains Mercury. Please dispose of according to local regulations."

On average, CFLs each contain 5 milligrams of mercury. However, all fluorescent lamps contain mercury, along with black lights, mercury vapor, high pressure sodium, and metal halide lamps, ultraviolet lamps, and neon lamps. Standard four-foot fluorescent tubes contain an average of 20 milligrams of mercury, ranging from 4 to 60 milligrams.

Here is the typical mercury content of various items:

CFL:	5 milligrams
Watch battery:	25 milligrams
Dental amalgams:	500 milligrams
Old thermometer:	500 milligrams
Sump pump switch:	2,000 milligrams

Mercury is toxic to the human nervous system. Exposure can lead to kidney damage and neurological damage, especially to unborn children.

The U.S. EPA estimates that over 800 million fluorescent lamps are disposed each year. Since one gram of mercury can contaminate a 2-acre pond, there is enough mercury in those lamps to contaminate 20 million acres of water.

CFLs use up to 75 percent less energy than incandescent bulbs, and last up to 10 times longer.

Coal-fired power plants produce mercury in the combustion process. That mercury escapes into the atmosphere and rain then returns it to the earth's surface, where it finds its way to water bodies and enters the food chain.

About 0.02 milligrams of mercury releases into the air for each kilowatt-hour of electricity generated by a coal power plant. The plant will emit 3.5 mg of mercury over the lifetime of a 20-watt CFL. But, the electricity required for a 75-watt incandescent bulb (the equivalent of a 20-watt CFL) will result in 13.16 mg of mercury emissions. So, even if spent or broken CFLs are landfilled, less mercury will enter the environment than by using incandescent bulbs.

But, fortunately, CFLs can be recycled and the mercury recovered, in the same process used to recycle fluorescent tubes. Both types of fluorescent lamps are accepted in the Illinois EPA's household hazardous waste programs.

Spent or broken CFLs are also being accepted at 148 Ace Hardware stores in northern Illinois through a partnership program with Ace, Commonwealth Edison, and the Illinois EPA. However, that program only runs through June 2008, so the only recycling option remains the IEPA programs.

Northwestern Holds Clothes Recycling Drive

Northwestern University teamed up with Fundraise & Recycle Clothes Now to hold a clothing drive during the university's move-out days. The drive helped to recycle over 13,000 pounds of clothes, shoes, accessories and more according to Julie Cahillane, Manager of Recycling and Refuse. The school received payment for all of the items collected. More than 800 pounds of food were also collected and donated to the NU Campus Kitchens

program. The clothing & food drive is an annual event that increases awareness for students to "take it" or "leave it" but don't throw it out. The Council for Textile Recycling estimates that 48 percent of reclaimed textiles are reused as

second-hand clothing, 20 percent become wiping and polishing cloths, and the remaining 26 percent are converted into fiber to be used in new textile products.
